Notes To Students and Parents

1. Students need to read these books carefully.
2. All of these books are available either at local libraries or local bookstores.
3. Class discussion, writing assignments, and tests during the first part of the fall semester will focus on these novels.
4. A cursory reading of the book is not adequate preparation for the book test given on the first Monday after school starts. The following suggestions should prove helpful for the study of summer reading books:
 - a. As students read, they should make notes about content.
 - b. Underlining and writing in the margins of personal copies of the books are ways to note the most significant material.
 - c. Students should write a brief summary of each chapter and make a list identifying major characters.
